project and ultimately the insights the marina industry needs to align our offer with future customers.


Following London we headed to Dusseldorf to the enormous BOOT show where we met with many more members, engaged in fascinating discussions and made many new acquaintances.



Once you've got the hang of it, the RYA Intermediate course will develop your skills further and in another couple of sessions, you'll soon be blasting across the water with confidence. There's plenty of follow on support available in clubs and many centres run refresher courses if you've had a break and want to get back into the sport.

START WINDSURFING

Perhaps you've always wanted to get on a windsurf board and just go! Many centres run taster sessions which you can do in a couple of hours but an RYA Start Windsurfing course is a thorough way to learn the basics like how to balance and what kit to use.

In a day you should be able to get up on the board, sail to a chosen point on the water, turn around and come back again and you don't have to live near the coast, as a reservoir or a lake are also good places to get a feel for the conditions and learn about prevailing winds.

University Research Raft

WALCON DELIVERS BESPOKE MARINE RESEARCH RAFT TO UNIVERSITY OF PORTSMOUTH

eading marina manufacturer Walcon Marine has designed, built and installed a bespoke Research Raft for the Institute of Marine Sciences at the University of Portsmouth. This multi-purpose platform is a valuable resource for the institute, supporting both the work that it undertakes for commercial organisations and projects conducted by undergraduate and postgraduate students.

The raft is a platform made up of a series on pontoons fitted together to create an external perimeter measuring 11.7 by 7.5 metres, plus a walkway running down the centre.

Researchers can then access two areas of enclosed water on either side of the walkway, each of which has six equipment rails running over the top. Safety rails run around both the external and internal perimeters with an access gate from the water on each of the longer sides.

The equipment rails are used to suspend experiments and instruments just below the surface of the water. Over time these will include tests of antifouling paint and their ability to counter marine organisms, assessments of biopolymers such as degradable



plastics, and renewable energy projects such as small tidal turbines. The university's forensic sciences department will also use the platform to study the effects of marine organisms on carcasses to enable them to better differentiate the marks left by. for example, crabs versus a knife, when a body has been submerged in the sea for any given length of time. The raft will also have a Seabin mounted on it for the collection and analysis of floating debris.

Other features include internal secure compartments to hold equipment and additional instruments, and the pontoons are fitted with GRP mesh decking for its low maintenance and excellent non-slip properties.

The Research Raft is now positioned in one of the main channels of Langstone Harbour, where it is exposed to the full tidal flow of up to six knots.

"We expect this to last at least 20 years," said Dr Ian Hendy, Senior Scientific Officer at the Institute of Marine Sciences, University of Portsmouth. "It's a large, solid piece of kit. Highly functional and exactly what we wanted. Walcon has delivered it perfectly and we are over the moon with it."

SPIRIT YACHTS UNDERTAKES PIVOTAL HULL ROLLOVER OF SPIRIT 111,

s one of the largest singlemasted wooden yachts to be built since Shamrock V in the 1930's, the Spirit 111' rollover at Spirit's Ipswich yard was an impressive feat. With a beam of 6.4m, the 111' rollover was the largest and most significant rollover in the history of Spirit Yachts.

Set to be completed in 2019, the elegant, sloop-rigged superyacht will feature unmatched eco credentials and will be one of a few superyachts capable of sailing without a professional crew due to its pioneering deck arrangement.

Its impressive strength to weight ratio, combined with carbon rig and energy efficient hydraulic deck hardware, will

performance. The interior of the vacht offers ultimate comfort for eight people.

The construction of the Spirit 111's 34m hull began with construction of laminated wooden ring frames along with a duplex stainless-steel central reinforcement cage. This was placed upside down onto a timber strongback before the centreline structure and beamshelves were fitted. The fore and aft planking was then bonded to the ringframes followed by quadruple-diagonal veneers, which were epoxybonded at 45° under vacuum before the hull was finally covered with an epoxy glass sheath.



Under sail, the system will automatically regenerate the batteries, and with careful consumption the vacht will operate solely under battery power. For longer distance propulsion, the owner has the option of two back-up generators. All equipment has been carefully selected to produce the minimum levels of emissions.



If successful, Jude will be the youngest man to row any ocean in the world and will become a Guinness World Record holder. They also hope to be the first vegans to complete the crossing.


Jude says, "This challenge means so much to us. If we can stop another family from suffering like ours has, then it'll all be worth it. We want to make dad proud."

threats to our marine biodiversity, ecosystems, public health and economy from unwanted pests and diseases. Marine biosecurity is a key component of national security and is essential to protecting our economic and environmental assets.

Invasive non-native species (INNS) are those that have been transported outside of their natural range and can damage

our environment, the economy, our health and the way we live. They can 'hitchhike' on the outside of vessels and in spaces within them as well as on equipment and clothing. The first line of defence is to stop new marine pests arriving, which requires both an international and a domestic approach. "Marinas and event organisers are an essential partner in helping to protect our marine environment," explains

The Green Blue's Campaign
Manager Kate Fortnam. "Events
taking place in and around
marinas present an ideal
opportunity for 'hitchhikers'
especially when participants
(and their boats) have travelled
long distances, or have come
from different waterbodies.
With this in mind, marine
biosecurity, taking action to
reduce the chance of spreading
INNS, can make a real
difference," Kate adds.

The Green Blue, the joint environmental awareness campaign set up by the RYA and British Marine, encourages all marinas and event organisers to make sure participants are aware that their help is needed to achieve good biosecurity.

"It's in everyone's interest to protect the natural environment that supports our industry and ensure that the growth of the sector is sustainable. In other words, making sure that meeting the needs of the present does not compromise the needs of future generations," says Kate.

The Green Blue supports sustainable development by demonstrating best practice, encouraging the design and production of innovative, environmentally benign products, facilities and processes within the recreational boating industry.

Its 'biosecurity best practice guidance' is to advise all marina users and event participants to have all boats, clothing and equipment checked, cleaned and dried before getting back on the water.

Rallies, regattas & races



- Check boats, equipment and clothing for living plants and animals. Pay particular attention to areas that are damp or hard to inspect.
- Clean and wash all equipment, thoroughly with freshwater and anti-foul boats annually. Remove visible fouling and put in the bin, not back in the water.
- Dry responsibly! When recovering a boat, trailer, dinghy, Personal Water Craft or RIB, drain water from every part and all equipment that can hold water, including any water that collects in bilges, before leaving the site. Clothing and equipment should be thoroughly dried for as long as possible before it is used elsewhere.



Check Clean Dry best practice.

"The vast majority of marinas and clubs will be aware of and following the Check Clean Dry best practice. Although the principles are simple to grasp, we are encouraging all marinas to think about exactly how they are managing Check Clean Dry for the constant flow of boats to and from their sites, and especially the infrastructure they need to put in place for events that could see them having to manage large numbers of boats at one time," concludes Kate.

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MAJOR ENHANCEMENTS PLANNED FOR FISHERMAN'S PONTOONS IN ST HELIER HARBOUR



major works programme to enhance the __commercial fisherman's pontoons in St Helier Harbour is due to start on Monday 26 February 2018. The 2-month project will involve the replacement of existing pontoons and equipment across two key operational areas used by the Island's fishing fleet; namely La Collette Berthing Pontoons opposite La Collette Yacht Basin along with the London Berth Landing Pontoon on the eastern side of Victoria Pier.

The existing pontoon equipment is over 25 years old and regular engineering inspections have stated that it is beyond the end of its serviceable life. With the current condition of the equipment it needs to be replaced to sustain the operational requirements of the Island's fishing industry.

The works project will provide the opportunity to introduce some notable enhancements to the existing layouts. The current pontoons do not meet the demands of the fishing fleet and there is currently a waiting list for these berths. While no additional piling will be undertaken, the revised design will see an increase in the overall number of berths available, rising from circa 45 berths to approximately 60 berths. Other notable enhancements will include:

- Increased pontoon widths and loading capabilities;
- Increased berthing provisions, which, for example, will see an additional 150m extension across both sites:

- Improved pontoon services, including access to power and water:
- Internally set piles within the pontoon structures will provide unobstructed berthing and improved efficiency and flexibility of berthing arrangements.

Marina Projects Ltd is once again managing the works programme on behalf of Ports of Jersey Ltd, having already successfully delivered a number of schemes in St Helier Harbour, including the replacement of the Albert Pier Pontoon in 2015 and the redevelopment of La Collette Yacht Basin in 2012. Following a competitive tender process, the supply and installation work will be carried out by Inland & Coastal Marina Systems (ICMS) supported by local subcontractors, Geomarine Ltd and Gordon Electrical Services Ltd. The supply of new electrical and water equipment is being provided by Rolec Services.

An overall budget of £720k, entirely funded by Ports of Jersey Ltd, has been allocated to the project, which, according to Abby Farahmand, Harbour Operations Manager for Ports of Jersey, will be of major benefit to the Island's fishing industry.





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RNLI DROWNING GAP





Welsh lifeboat man and his son made a barefoot protest at the London Boat Show 2018

Father and son, Huw (43) and Steffan Williams (9), could be seen today walking half-dressed and barefoot to the RNLI stand at the London Boat Show, at the ExCel exhibition centre, in a symbolic protest against the RNLI taking vital equipment away from their lifeboat station in West Wales.

The pair travelled over two hundred and fifty miles to the capital to raise awareness of the RNLI's plan to remove the only

all-weather lifeboat from the county of Ceredigion in 2020, creating what has been dubbed the 'Drowning Gap' by the Ceredigion Lifeboat Campaign.

The 'Drowning Gap' is the sea area in Cardigan Bay which is currently served by an allweather lifeboat at New Quay. Under the RNLI's current plans, when this boat is withdrawn at the end of its operational life, there will be a gap of over 70 miles of coastline between the nearest all-weather lifeboat stations in Barmouth and Fishguard.

There has been an all-weather lifeboat in New Quay for over one hundred and fifty years but, while the RNLI are rolling out state-of-the-art Shannon class all-weather lifeboats around the coast of the UK and Ireland, New Quay has been chosen as one of the first stations to lose allweather lifeboat capability in the RNLI's recent Coast Review.

Whilst the RNLI has refused to publish its Coast Review report, it is clear that the decision to downgrade lifesaving provision will result in cost savings running into millions of pounds. However, a report published by the Ceredigion Lifeboat Campaign claims that 25% of rescues carried out by New Quay's all-weather lifeboat could not have been achieved by the inshore lifeboat that the RNLI plan to station in New Quay.

Speaking at the show Huw Williams, a volunteer RNLI crewman and spokesperson for the Ceredigion Lifeboat Campaign said, "The Ceredigion coast is busy with passenger boats, leisure craft, and commercial fishing activity. Boats can sink and people can get swept out to sea in seconds. It is well documented that hypothermia is a killer after 30 minutes, and that means that every second counts. Whilst inshore lifeboats are good at what they do, they cannot launch in severe weather, meaning a wait of up to 90 minutes for a lifeboat to arrive.

"The introduction of new. faster lifeboats was supposed to improve rescue capability but, in Ceredigion, we will see a return to response times not seen since the 1970s and 80s.

This puts lives at risk unnecessarily. As lifeboat crew members, we are happy to give our time voluntarily; all we ask for is the right equipment for the job."

Joining Huw in London is his son, Steffan. Last summer, at only eight years old, Steffan made headlines across the world after twice rescuing people cut off by the tide. Steffan is passionate about the water, and particularly lifeboats. As well as being a keen RNLI fundraiser, he wants to follow in his father's footsteps as a lifeboat crewman.

Steffan commented, "I am very upset that the RNLI are not replacing our lifeboat with a new Shannon. I want to join the crew when I am 17 years old and hope they will change their minds. The sea can be dangerous and we need the right boat to help

people when it's stormy. One day, I hope to be the coxswain." Unless the RNLI change their minds, Steffan's ambition now seems to be out of the question.

Huw added, "The RNLI's 'Plans and Purpose' states: "We aim to ensure our crews can reach at least 90% of all casualties within 10 nautical miles of the coast, within 30 minutes of a lifeboat launch in any weather." Under the RNLI's current plans, this will be unachievable in Ceredigion from 2020. Why are we being treated differently?"

DEVELOPING A YOUTH CULTURE FOR MARINAS

ast October's Nieuwpoort International Boat Show (October 2017) brought together an international panel to discuss how to bring youngsters back to marinas.

TransEurope Marinas
Chairman Jean-Michel Gaigné
joined fellow CMM (Certified
Marina Managers) Oscar Siches
and Steven Desloovere, together
with local and national youth
sailing activity organisers.

The last decade has revealed a major demographical shift in boat owners and also, over a longer period, a substantial upheaval in the traditional use of leisure time, with people less likely to consider justifying the time and resources to the demands of boat ownership. Further to this, local sailing clubs are finding it hard to maintain numbers outside summer months and so

addressing the appeal of boating to our younger generations has become an essential topic for discussion.

Maarten Desloovere, who is part of the VY Nieuwpoort marina team, is running a project in which old unused yachts are brought out of hibernation on the hard and taken on by groups of young people for refit and eventual use on the water. "One of the first issues that was apparent was that we needed to involve millennials and obtain their feedback in order to find solutions. From the outset this means communicating along the same channels using social media and messaging apps."

Marinas, it transpires, have become places that can hold less and less interest for younger people, there being key years



whereby they are unlikely to have the financial means to be able to afford a boat and so if boating isn't a family pursuit (or they have friends with boats, having perhaps developed skills as a child), it is improbable that they would make use of marinas beyond as a place of work.

The 2015 Ecorys "Study on the competitiveness of the recreational boating sector", presented by the European Boating Industry suggests the following:

"The problem for the sector is that if people don't start young, experience shows that they won't start at a later age... Today's users of boats appear to be less willing to accept long preparation of their boating trips, constant maintenance or dealing with upcoming problems, leading to decreasing tendencies to own a boat and an increased growth demand for charters. They want to go to their preferred destination, have a boat ready and everything functioning throughout their holidays."

Even in the event that younger people have had the opportunity to attend a club with an experienced

management that manages to set people on this path, it is clear that even within a successful sailing club dynamic, not all young people will become champions and so their gentle progression through different types of boat (dinghy keel boat - cruising boat) needs careful facilitating. Financial/time/peer constraints after having outgrown the club dinghy, may mean that is simpler easier to give up and so the fun element is paramount especially when the complications of adolescence and the pervasive call of online gaming threaten to tip the balance.

Those of us in the sector know from our experience that boating can engender a profound passion and serves to address so many valuable aspects of our lives, such as a huge sense of personal and group achievement, thrilling adventure, necessary physical activity, sporting competition and a beneficial connection with nature.

How then to convey this to younger people? Some of the suggestions that arose during the meeting were as follows:

- Set up a cooperation network with the schools in surrounding towns.
- Organise sailing weeks for young professionals under 35
- Create an experience. Change the image which young people have of marinas.
- Organise a yearly go-boating day with all watersport clubs
- Provide boats for people which they can use/rent at low prices. If this is outside the scope of the marinas available funds, seek cooperation from club members or customers who may wish to take new crew out with them.
- Inquire with owners of abandoned boats to if they are willing to gift their boat to youngsters with the engagement to restore it.

To attract younger people to the sector, it seems that a fully multifaceted approach need to taken; working with youth to build a local culture based around a variety of fun watersports and events - together with numerous stakeholders, whilst engaging young people on different levels and developing essential maintenance skills for future employment opportunities.

This continues to be a very relevant conversation and a worthy topic for further study; well done to VY Nieuwpoort for addressing the issue!

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WHY IS RIVER THAMES BOAT REGISTRATION SO IMPORTANT?

ick McKie-Smith explains why timely registration of the boats kept or used on the non-tidal River Thames is so important to the boating community. Nick is Compliance Manager for the Environment Agency's River Thames Waterways Team, comprising of 100 navigation specialists whose work enables and enhances the boating experience on the non-tidal Thames.

The Environment Agency (EA) is the navigation authority for the non-tidal River Thames, 135 miles of navigable waterway from Cricklade in Wiltshire, near the river's source, to Teddington in south west London where it becomes tidal. The EA owns, maintains and operates 45 sets of locks and weirs and hundreds of other assets which facilitates boating and other recreational watersports activities on the Thames. Many of these are important heritage assets which the Environment Agency is custodian of on behalf of the nation. Without this vital infrastructure leisure boat navigation of the Thames would not be possible. Through providing this service to the boater the EA also supports many businesses, such as marinas, which rely on leisure boating income.

In addition the EA team encourage and enable responsible and safe boating, much of this work is around delivering and enforcing

legislation which applies to navigation of the river including the Environment Agency (Inland Waterways) Order 2010 (IOW), and the Thames Conservancy Acts and Byelaws.The IOW requires the owner or master of any boat kept or used on the non-tidal River Thames to have a current registration for that boat; for which there is a fee to pay. The income this generates is directly invested by the **Environment Agency in services** that benefit all recreational and commercial boaters on the nontidal Thames.

Government makes a significant contribution too, as do water companies and other organisations who rely on the Environment Agency's management of water levels and weirs. Boat registration income however is vital to EA's operations and represents in excess of half of the organisations income.

The EA team work hard to control costs and generate income but every boat owner who fails to register their boat is both depriving the EA of vital income and consuming significant staff time in chasing registration fees and taking enforcement action. This inevitably means that less money and time is spent on maintaining and managing the non-tidal Thames navigation. So it is in everyone's interest for correct boat registration fees to be paid by 1st January every year.

For clarity and as recently reinforced in the High Court all boats afloat in marinas (online or offline) must have a valid registration. Failing to register a boat is a criminal offence and the Environment Agency has a 100% success rate for prosecutions brought against the owners of unregistered boats, all of whom now have a criminal record as a result.

To obtain a registration from the Environment Agency, it is necessary for boats to have a valid Boat Safety Certificate and insurance (minimum third party). This provides reassurance for everyone in the boating community that any registered boat on the Thames is likely to be safe and insured.

The majority of boat owners resister their boats by 1st January however there is still a significant minority who choose to defraud the rest of the Thames boating community of the vital funding that is essential to maintain the nontidal Thames navigation for the enjoyment of responsible boaters.

The Environment Agency's River Thames Waterways Team greatly appreciate the support of non-tidal River Thames marina staff in their help to ensure that all boats in their marinas have a valid and displayed boat registration.

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NEW ROODBERG PHA100 HOIST FOR THE PORT OF LONDON AUTHORITY



he Port of London
Authority have recently
taken delivery of a brand
new Roodberg PHA100 boat
hoist, supplied via The Pontoon
and Dock Company Ltd. Located
at Denton Wharf, this is the
second Roodberg machine at this
site, complimenting an RBT30
hydraulic boat mover trailer.

This hoist has been purchased to replace the smaller capacity machine from another

manufacturer which had been in use for around 10 years. As well as being able to lift larger vessels, the PHA is more fuel-efficient (stop-start technology), ecofriendly and much more manoeuvrable. It means the PLA Marine Services team can lift the majority of the authority's more than 40 vessels out of the Thames and deal with a wider variety of third-party Thames boats too.


"Replacing our boat lift with a new, higher capacity one underlines how important this operation has become, both to the PLA and the wider Thames community," said PLA marine operations director, Peter Steen. "Over the past 10 years we have invested more than £10 million in creating at Denton the well-equipped boat yard and load out facility it is today. Bringing in a higher capacity boat lift, with greater functionality, means we're well set for the future."

PLA mechanical and electrical engineer Dave Fallows said:
"This new equipment is able to deal with all our heavier vessels, with the only exception being London Titan. It's much quieter than the existing machine, with heavy duty industrial tyres considerably reducing the risk of punctures."
